EMERGENCY REQUEST FROM FAMILY MEMBER TO SEND MONEY – SCAM WARNING

Another scam warning from banks about receiving a text message apparently from a family member saying they have lost their phone and have borrowed one from a passer-by, or damaged it and it's nearly out of power. They are desperate to get some cash to pay an urgent invoice, restaurant bill, medical bill, car rescue bill, anything – but it's urgently required. "Please transfer some money to this account...."

Of course it's not true.

STEALING FROM THE DECEASED

It might sound an impossible thing to do, apart from it being an inhumane act, but it is a fast rising type of identity theft - taking on the mantle of the dead. It can be a recent bereavement or even someone who died years before. But above the money is the distress it can cause the bereaved families.

How It Works

The criminals will search for a bereavement notice, usually of an elderly person, in a newspaper, and then apply for a certificate of birth in the name of the deceased. They can then discover where the person lived and other details, enough to possibly obtain a National Insurance number or driving licence, that will allow the criminals to successfully apply for loans and credit cards. The first the relatives of the dead know is when they receive a call about unpaid bills.

Another way is for the criminal to view the house of the deceased once it's put up for sale. All too often mail, such as credit card offers or bank statements, is left lying around. It can be easy to pick these up to begin taking over the identity.

Why are the identities of the deceased so desirable?

Firstly, it takes longer for anyone to discover there's even been a theft, giving the crooks more time to rack up bills. Secondly, older people tend to have been more scrupulous about money, which means that they have sound financial histories, making payments on time, so obtaining credit cards and loans in the deceased's name becomes easier.

❖ How To Avoid It

- Don't put a bereavement notice in the newspaper. It becomes a magnet for criminals, and from the tiniest pieces of information they can piece together the identity of the dead.
- If you're selling a house of the deceased, make sure all personal information regarding the former owner is locked away. Remove and shred all mail before anyone views the house. Inform the Post Office of the death and have mail redirected to a relative.
- Inform the credit reference agencies of the death. This prevents anybody from taking out any loans and credit cards in the name of the deceased, or running up debts on stolen cards.
- Give the deceased's name to the United Kingdom Bereavement Register, an organisation that stops junk mail going to the deceased.

Click **Your area** then in the **Find your local area** box enter **S25** then click on **S25 Sheffield** This will show **Rotherham South** Click on **Crime Map** and select the month.

The above is fine if you are looking at a small area. If you want to identify crimes in an area such as South Anston or North Anston, you need to determine what latitude and longitude boundaries define that area. Then download the data in spreadsheet (csv) format and construct selection formulae using the boundary definitions. (It's not straight forward!). To do this, from the above website click on **Download area crime data** select **South Yorkshire Police** then **Generate file.** This will create a zip file to download. This file contains details for Barnsley, Doncaster, Rotherham and Sheffield, and has around 16,000 items every month.
