> FAKE PARKING QR CODES

Since the pandemic, QR codes - a type of barcode that looks like a square with a black and white pattern - have grown in popularity, and can be used as a payment method. But the success of QR codes is now being exploited by scammers, leading to a recent spike in QR tricks at UK car parks. Drivers have been caught out by fake QR codes for parking payment apps being stuck on ticket machines that actually direct them to third-party scam sites to trick customers into sharing their credit card details or to download malware onto phones to steal personal information. There are several things to look out for on an authentic QR code when using a car park ticket machine.

Key give-aways to watch out for to protect yourself

- Check that the website that a QR code directs to should start with "https://" and there is a padlock icon next to the web site address. It's a good idea to also check that the name of the website you're directed to matches the business.
- Consistent branding: The design of a QR code should match the business's branding. If the branding or logo appears to be different or there are suspicious elements on the code itself, such as if it looks like it has been stuck over another code, it could be a sign that the QR code may not have been made by the business.
- Two-factor authentication: Two-factor authentication is a key security feature when making online payments. Secure sites will have a Visa Secure, MasterCard SecureCode, or American Express SafeKey logo on them. When you make a payment you'll be asked to authenticate your cardholder details to provide an additional layer of security against fraud.

Rogue adverts

Beware of a website called Alltainment that a can pop up unexpectedly and you can end up paying a monthly subscription of £39.99 for an entertainment package. Many people have reported that they tried to download parking apps – such as JustPark, Parkonomy, PayByPhone and Ringgo – but somehow ended up signing up for Alltainment instead. Searching Google for a legitimate parking apps can produce links to websites called uk.apkpac.com, which promotes apps and games. One webpage appears to feature a promotion for the JustPark app, but it actually hosts a series of 'clickable' adverts for Alltainment. Other adverts that could be misleading include one for 'Fine10' that links to a website called flirtymeetings – company name Automation Programs Solutions Ltd. This site charges a £1.25 'profile setup fee' then an eyewatering £46.75 per month if you don't cancel after a one-day trial. JustPark confirmed that the uk.apkpac is not affiliated with it in any way, and urges victims to report scams. It has no association with Flirtymeetings or Alltainment, and both advertisers have already been reported for product misrepresentation, scamming and copyright infringement to the relevant advertising platforms.

How to report rogue advertising and scams

It is against Google's rules for advertisers to impersonate brands or businesses, or use techniques such as cloaking to circumvent its systems. You can report scam ads directly to the relevant platform as well as the Advertising Standards Authority (ASA). Although the ASA only regulates ads by legitimate businesses, it notifies all participating platforms with key details of reported scam adverts to have it removed. If you give away bank details or lose money to a scam, call your bank immediately using the number on the back of your card and report the scam to Action Fraud.

- ❖ Emergencies: call 999: when there is a threat to life; a traffic accident where persons are injured, the road is blocked or a vehicle involved in the accident has failed to stop; a serious offence is in progress; violence to a person or damage to property is imminent; a suspected offender is still at the scene of a crime or any delay in reporting the incident may prevent the offender being apprehended; serious disruption to the public is currently taking place or is likely to take place.

Non-emergencies: call 101: to report a crime not currently taking place, or to give information. Calls to 101 cost 15 pence per call from landlines and mobiles - no matter how long you're on the phone.

Report an incident online: As an alternative to 101, you can report a non-emergency incident online at *https://www.reportingcrime.uk*, or from the main SYP web page under *Report something* **Advice for Victims:** on the home page of SYP, information about support and useful contact details of other supporting agencies you can access.
