> MORE ONLINE SCAMS

Ticket scams

Going to a gig, festival or sports event is great fun – but becoming a victim of ticket fraud isn't. That's why you should only buy tickets from official vendors, the box office, or reputable reseller sites. Scammers typically pose as a seller and post their 'tickets for sale' on social media or an online marketplace. They'll tell you they'll post or email the tickets after you've transferred the money into their bank account. But when nothing arrives and you try to contact them, they've completely disappeared. This happens to thousands of music, sports, and other fans every year, who get tricked into buying fake or non-existent tickets.

How to stay safe:

- only buy tickets from the venue's box office, official vendors, or reputable reseller sites
- don't open links or attachments on social media, texts, or emails offering tickets, as they could send you to fraudulent or malware sites
- avoid paying for tickets via bank transfer
- check a seller's privacy and returns policies
- keep receipts until after the event.

Clickbait scams

Fraudsters try to get you to click on links in ads, emails, messages and comments on social media. But once you take the bait, you could find yourself on a website designed to hijack your account or steal your information. What to look out for:

- Scammers will try to hook you in with words like "shocking", "secret", "exclusive". Be wary of anything promising to give you inside information, sensational news, special access or exclusive offers.
- As well as attention-grabbing posts, clickbait scams can take the form of browser notifications, antivirus updates, surveys, quizzes, 'miracle cures' and messages from fake tech support companies.
- If you are receiving strange messages from someone you know, or see unusual posts containing links or directions to other websites, it's possible they may have been hacked. Be wary of any downloads, attachments or links they might send.

How to stay safe

- Hover your cursor over a link and look in the bottom left corner or 'destination bar' to see where it's really going to take you and use common sense if the link doesn't look right.
- Don't click on links in emails from addresses you don't recognise, or that you weren't expecting and don't download attachments from senders you don't know and trust.
- Be wary of links that look like login pages for social media sites. If you're already logged in, or the page doesn't look like the one you recognise, close the tab.
- If you think you've been a victim of fraud, call the number on the back of your bank card.

> BANK SECURITY PHONE CALL – DISPLAYING FAKE PHONE NUMBER

You may receive a phone call that displays an 01909 number, hence appearing to be local, and warning of a security risk to your card transactions or bank account. As often with such calls, the number is fake, and there is usually no mention of which bank the call is supposedly from. The call is usually a recording, and can mention subscriptions for such as television services, mobile phone service, and Amazon. Ofcom advises people not to trust the caller ID display on their phone when trying to avoid scams. It also instructs people not to give out personal information in response to an incoming call.

Emergencies: call 999: when there is a threat to life (including traffic accidents where persons are injured, the road is blocked or a vehicle involved in the accident has failed to stop); a serious offence is actually in progress; violence to a person or damage to property is imminent; a suspected offender is still at the scene of a crime or any delay in reporting the incident may prevent the offender being apprehended; serious disruption to the public is currently taking place or is likely to take place.

Non-emergencies: call 101 to report a crime not currently taking place, or to give information. Report an incident online: As an alternative to 101, you can report a non-emergency incident online at *https://www.reportingcrime.uk* or from the main SYP web page under *Report* Advice and information: on the home page of SYP there are details of supporting agencies you can access. The Silent Solution: If you need urgent police help but cannot speak: Dial 999; Listen to the questions from the operator; Respond by coughing or tapping your device, if you can. If prompted, press 55 to let the operator know it's a genuine emergency and you'll be put through to police.
